We're Homell

This spring, we welcomed three siblings into OCC who had been removed from their home. The youngest was seven. While they were awaiting placement in a foster home, our staff went to work to nurture and support them. After just a few days here, they began to brighten up, smile, and become playful children. One afternoon, they came running in the front door from the school bus and as the door opened, they exclaimed, "We're home! We're home!" If that doesn't give you "the feels," nothing will! That's the work that OCC staff does every single day for youth in crisis. Thank you for making sure there is a place for these children to call home when they are at their most vulnerable.

Retiring Executive Director Linda Ragsdale Reflects on Our 40 Years

Forty years of helping kids. Can you believe that? This year marks OCC's 40th birthday! In those forty years, we have cared for, comforted, and guided children who have had to deal with tremendous challenges in their young lives. Sometimes those challenges have led to poor decision making that has gotten them in trouble. Many times, our children are left in limbo and loss through NO fault of their own, but because of the actions (or inactions) of dysfunctional parents or guardians. However these youngsters arrive at OCC's doors, we continue our 40 year tradition and mission to bring resources, redirection, and hope for their futures.



For almost seven years, I've had the distinct honor and privilege to be part of this amazing organization. Although there have been plenty of challenges along the way, there have been many more rewards. I am especially inspired by the amazing staff who—in spite of low pay rates—give so generously of their hearts and souls to make a positive difference in the lives of our kids. I have discovered that even when staff move onto other opportunities (usually more remunerative), their experience working with our youth stays with them. For once a part of OCC—whether client or staff—I think maybe OCC stays in your heart.

Some years ago, we shifted our focus from being behavior monitors, to a more therapeutic care approach. Together we as OCC Staff have learned to stop asking, "What did you do?" or "What's wrong with you?" and begin asking instead: "What has happened to you and how

can we help?" This paradigm shift, resulting from our trauma-informed care training, has radically transformed our understanding and effectiveness with these children – something I am very proud of!

One of my great privileges as Executive Director is to have experienced the incredible support for OCC –specifically for our kids – from our community through funding and advocacy, from our volunteers who bring their unique talents and kind spirits to help our kids, and from our very active and committed Board of Directors. The generosity of our donors, of event sponsors, and those who bring in-kind support has filled my heart with deep appreciation for everyone who has kept OCC strong these past forty years.

So this June, as I take my leave from OCC for a much awaited retirement from my 45 years in human services, I look forward to joining this magnanimous community in continuous support of OCC and encourage its best efforts yet for the next forty years of serving youth in crisis. If I could leave you with my parting admonition, it is to encourage you to recognize that the youth who come to OCC are really amazing kids, resourceful survivors, have a determination to make it, and are quite literally our future. We must give them every opportunity available to succeed, which I hope becomes a reality that we can witness for each one.

I am proud, honored, and so very thankful for the opportunity I have had to serve. What a joy it has been to make a difference in and for the lives of these children, and to have served with the staff who care for them daily. I may be shifting my role here, but as they say--once you've been a part of OCC it is always in your heart. I know it will always be in mine.

The Drug Crisis Isn't Just About Street Drugs

When people discuss substance abuse, they often think about drug dealers in back alleys, but that is not the complete story. A major factor in the drug abuse epidemic involves legal, prescription drugs. In fact, in Arkansas, we have the highest rate of teen abuse of prescription pain medication in the entire United States. That's pretty alarming! By the time Garland County students reach their senior year in high school, 21% have abused prescription drugs – and guess where they get them? The answer is shocking: 71% were given, bought, or stolen from friends or relatives.

In other words, the family medicine cabinet is a major source of our state's alarming rate of youth prescription medicine abuse. What can be done to curb this disturbing trend? There are three simple steps you can take: (1) monitor and take inventory of your prescriptions on a regular basis, (2) secure your prescriptions in a locked location, and (3) dispose of your prescriptions properly. There are prescription drug drop boxes conveniently located at the Garland County Sheriff's Department (525 Ouachita Ave.), Hot Springs Police Department (641 Malvern Ave.), Hot Springs Village Police Department (113 Calella Drive), and Walgreen's (3631 Central Ave.).

The killer in your medicine cabinet can become less lethal by taking these simple actions that will

restrict access by young people. The good news is that you can be part of the solution and help to prevent prescription drug abuse and the horrors of unintentional drug overdose deaths.


Disc Golf Tournament—Rain or Shine!
